

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We strongly suggest that all members of our community make use of our new website. Professionally constructed, the website contains all the key information about our school including term dates, school routine, Cambridge examinations, curriculum plans, and extra-curricular activities. A number of documents, for example the school prospectus and newsletters, can be downloaded in .pdf format, and the website also contains a gallery of the everyday life of the High School.



Mid-Term Assessments

Mid-term assessments comprise a single page document to be completed by teachers on October 13th and issued to parents via the School diary. These are in addition to the reports issued at the end of term. Focussing on academic progress, the assessments will identify any academic challenges a student faces well in advance of any examination. Students will be graded according to the following criteria:

Grade 1

- The student consistently displays **excellent** knowledge and application in all areas of the subject.
- Class work, homework and assessments are consistently high. There may be the very occasional slip but this does not detract from the overall quality of the tasks.
- Targets set are exclusively designed to enhance the student's potential within the subject rather than to address any weakness.

Grade 2

- The student consistently displays **very good** knowledge and application in all areas of the

subject, although there are some minor weaknesses preventing the attainment of Grade 1. Alternatively, there is a weakness in one area of the subject which prevents the attainment of Grade 1. This characteristic is also displayed in one or more of class work, homework or assessments.

- Most targets set are designed to enhance the student's potential within the subject although there will be the occasional target which addresses a weakness preventing the attainment of the higher grade.

Grade 3

- Class work, homework and assessments most frequently reflect a **satisfactory** performance.
- All or the majority of results are within the mid-range or 'pass' mark within the subject criteria.
- Some targets set are designed to enhance the student's potential in the subject but most address current weaknesses.

Grade 4

- The student's knowledge and application are **variable / borderline** in some or all areas of the subject.
- Targets set are exclusively or almost exclusively designed to address current weaknesses, but weaknesses which can easily be rectified.
- Class work, homework and assessments do not consistently meet the expected levels for this year group.

Grade 5

- The student displays **considerable weakness** in all or most areas of the subject. There is evidence of significant gaps in knowledge or inability in application which seriously limit progress.
- Targets set are designed exclusively to address current weaknesses.

Students are also assessed + (good) / s (satisfactory) / - (unsatisfactory) in terms of their effort in each subject.



Assembly: September 11th

Sixteen years ago, the world witnessed the devastating Al Qaeda attacks on the World Trade Centre and the Pentagon. On September 11th the Principal presented an assembly describing to the students what took place on that terrible day and the effects it had on the lives of ordinary people, emphasizing that no true solutions are ever found through violence. Students watched dramatic footage of the events and were shown the timeline of the senseless atrocities.





On September 25th Mr Max conducted an assembly on the importance of looking after your heart. This was in recognition of **'World Heart Day'** on Friday September 29th. Approximately 13% of all deaths in Cambodia are related to cardiovascular disease (heart attack and stroke disease) and so it is important that the students are aware of the risks and what they can do to lower them.

As a follow up activity in tutor period, each student wrote on a cardboard heart cut-out one thing they would do to improve their 'heart health'. We also wanted to reach out to the wider community by inviting parents to complete the same task, and the responses were displayed in the school's courtyard.



Visit by Austin Heights International School

This year they will be spending an entire day with us at ISSR, and sports competitions will take place at Chun Lung Sports Club. Year Nine English: "Stone Cold"



In Year 9 English, students have been reading a book called 'Stone Cold' which deals with the issue of homelessness. Students researched a variety of homeless signs and analysed the language used in them. Students found that the most common features in these signs were: politeness markers, religious terminology, power of 3, alliteration, emotive language, personal pronouns and personal anecdotes. Students then created their own sign using the language features they had previously identified and other students from school were able to give pretend money to the sign they believed to be the most effective. Peace proved to have the most effective sign! Year 9 have responded to this topic in a very sensitive and thoughtful way.




The School at work: ECAs on September 8th 2017
